

A Note from Our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

As we enter into the month of October, we can look forward to the beautiful colors of the changing season, for summer has already turned to fall. And as the weather gets cooler, we bring out the warm sweaters and look forward to cuddling up by the warmth of a fire. And pumpkin spice, and apple and cinnamon, and all the flavors of fall once again draw our fancy. Halloween decorations and costumes must be prepared, and Lutherans in particular, remember Reformation Day and Martin Luther for taking a theological stand, claiming we are saved by grace through faith!

It's going to be a wonderfully exciting month, and it starts out on October 2nd with a simple celebration for all God's creatures, as many of us gather to have a blessing of our pets. Which reminds me of a story to share.

Everything we have belongs to God. We are His stewards.

What Belongs to God?

Traditionally the latter part of the Pentecost season has been a time of stewardship emphasis in our congregations. On any given Sunday in October or November you might hear a message on stewardship in your congregation. I remember vividly the feeling of panic that came upon me when I was a young

and newly ordained pastor and needed to come up with a stewardship message for my congregation on "Stewardship Sunday." So when a lay member of the congregation volunteered to present a program on tithing I was elated and gladly accepted his offer. For his presentation he set up two tables in the front of the sanctuary. Then he began to demonstrate how we have been richly blessed by God and how little God requires of us in return. The presenter did this by taking 10 apples putting 9 of them on one table and one apple on the other. He did the same with 10 bananas and 10 oranges and 10 shirts, etc. Soon the table with the 9 items of each kind was stacked high with all kinds of blessings. And the table with one of each kind was dramatically less abundant. His point was that tithing was a small thing to do in comparison to all that we have received. God gives us abundantly and expects so little of us, that we can surely give that little tithe. Then came the clincher when pointing to the abundant table of blessings, and said, "God has given us all this to do whatever we want, so at least we can give a tithe back to God."

Through the years I have come to understand how limited this concept of stewardship is. Sure, God does ask us to tithe. That is biblical. But the Bible doesn't stop with the tithe. Biblical stewardship has more to do with what we do with the 90% left after we tithe. These gifts are not just ours to do with as we please. All that God gives us is to be used according to God's will for us, our family, our community, our nation and all people. One of the Gospel stories we hear in congregations this time of year is the story of Jesus' encounter with the Pharisees. Trying to entrap him they asked, "Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?" Jesus' answer was simple. He asked for a coin they used to pay the tax and then said, "Whose head and title is on this coin?" They answered, "The emperor's." Jesus said, "Give therefore to the emperor that things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's." And what belongs to God? Everything belongs to God. All things come from God and all things return to God. And all that we have been given is on loan to us from God and is to be used according to God's will. To be a "steward" is to be in charge of someone else's property, which is to be used according to the owner's wishes. That's the biblical concept of stewardship.

Therefore stewardship includes all that we do and say. It includes all our resources and how we use them for the good of others. It includes all of our money and how we spend it. It includes how we respond to the needs of our neighbor and our world. It includes issues of justice and welfare for all God's people. The tithe is a biblical concept that is meant just to be a beginning point for our stewardship. And it is a good beginning point, but it is only a beginning point. I encourage you to look beyond the tithe as you consider the stewardship of the resources God has given you. We often pray:

Merciful Father, we offer with joy and thanksgiving what you have first given us — ourselves, our time, and our possessions, signs of your gracious love. Receive them for the sake of him who offered himself for us, Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.



Stewardship Sunday Is Coming November 14

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Our congregation's stewardship committee has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. *New Consecration Sunday* encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Stewardship Sunday, November 14, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Stewardship Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our pastor or leader will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Stewardship Sunday events through the Stewardship team and governing council members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Stewardship Sunday worship.

Highlights for September

The monthly Church Council meeting was held via Zoom on September 20th. Treasurer's report included monthly Benevolence offerings and other income of \$21,182 for August (YTD total is \$287,716) (These amounts include the second PPP loan and Endowment Committee funds for technology). Operating expenses were \$40,633 in August (YTD total is \$279,866).

The Pastor's report: Regularly scheduled weekly and monthly programs have resumed. Building use requests have increased, including Camp Lincolnshire's request for next summer. Volunteers are needed to assist with worship services and service recording. Blessing of the pets is scheduled for October 2, subject to weather and interest. Growth reported that yard signs and signage continue to spark interest and participation. We are actively promoting events in the Lincolnshire kiosk and on social media. Christian Education reported that Backpack Blessing with celebration in August and Rally Day on September 12 were very successful. Sunday School classes have resumed. Youth will be conducting a car wash on September 26. Human Needs reported on collection of over \$1,800 for Holy Family Ministries, far exceeding our \$1,000 goal. In October we will collect and package college student treat boxes; information and requests are being posted and circulated. We will donate Thanksgiving dinners to Vernon Township food pantry in November. We continue outreach to PADs to plan for the upcoming PADs season. Finance reported that the PPP loan has been forgiven and thanked Jeanne Nelson and Daaron Dohler for their effort regarding the loan. Stewardship reported that Time and Talent forms are available for completion and also will be circulated electronically. Fellowship reported on the outdoor movie and fellowship night on September 24. CUFF is working with WELCA to present a benefit for C.O.O.L. Ministries featuring Bill and Mia Vaanenen on November 6, with a dinner preceding. Long Range Planning reported on assembly of focus groups to obtain broad-based input regarding the congregation's mission and activities. Worship and Music reported that worship service assistants, ushers, hymn selectors, service recorders, and altar guild volunteers are needed. Choirs are rehearsing and participating in the 10:45 service. Two services now are being held on Sunday. Property reported on a productive work day in August. Joel has been working on a variety of building repair and maintenance projects. A work day is scheduled for October 9. Technology reported on ongoing efforts to secure assistants to record worship services. New Business: The Nominating Committee will begin work on a Council slate for next year.

Next council meeting currently is scheduled for October 11th at 6:30 PM. All council meetings are open to Holy Spirit members. Minutes and reports of the council are kept in a public notebook in the narthex.
