A Note from Our Pastor

Dear Friends in Christ,

As the days get shorter and darker, and as we continue to feel the oppressive grip of COVID-19. The word of Isaiah that we often hear this time of year caught my attention. The prophet wrote, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness – on them light has shined." During these times, it can feel like we're living in darkness, and that's why it's so essential to look for the light.

I recently heard about a village at the bottom of a canyon in Norway that hardly receives any sunlight. During the long Norwegian winters, when the sun barely rises over the horizon, the people of Rjukan live in perpetual twilight. Even in middle of summer, sunlight is limited by the canyon walls, and only in the middle of the day do you receive direct sunlight.

The effects on the human spirit were predictable. Rjukan was a dark, depressing place to live.

The idea of reflecting sunlight into the valley with mirrors was first dreamed up in 1913, but a little over a century later, technology made it a reality. At a cost of nearly a million dollars, three immense mirrors were constructed atop surrounding peaks. Carefully situated to catch the maximum amount of sunlight, their angle adjusted throughout the day by solar powered electric motors, Rjukan's mirror array now reflects winter sunlight down into the valley.

The change in the quality of life has been dramatic. Even the mirror's biggest opponents have been won over. "I thought it would be a waste because we have a lot of bad weather here," Robert Jenbergsen told the New York Times. "But when we got the sun, you could see the happiness it brought. We had never seen anything like that before."

What was once a parking lot in the village's center has become a town square, a bustling hub where neighbors pause to socialize. This rarely happened in winters past, when villagers hurried from building to building with downcast eyes, collars raised against the bitter wind.

When the mirrors were first installed, townspeople delightedly donned sunglasses and unfolded beach chairs in the parking lot, tilting their faces toward the light. Now, benches grace the sunniest spots. The town is considering installing a fountain to make the square even more of a gathering place.

The citizens of Rjukan once walked in darkness. Now - thanks to the high-tech wizardry of their mountaintop mirrors - they see a great light.

The prophet Isaiah never knew a Norwegian winter, but he didn't have to. Anyone who's ever lived through a dark night can appreciate the cheering properties of light.

The prophet Isaiah wrote, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness – on them light has shined."

Jesus Christ was born into the world to save the light-starved villagers of Rjukan, and all of us light-starved believers in our times of darkness. "I am the light of the world." Jesus proclaimed, "Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life."

Light brings hope. When dawn breaks and darkness flees, hope returns to the human spirit. Most of us are happy when the sun rises. We have renewed hope that the day will bring many blessings.

Jesus is our light, and Jesus brings hope. His birth reminds us that there is hope for the world. His birth reminds us that he brings the hope of salvation. His birth reminds us that he offers the gift of eternal life. His birth reminds us that in our bleakest hour, he is close beside us.

As we continue to navigate through these dark times, put your faith and hope in Jesus, for he is our hope and our joy and our light! Have a blessed Christmas!

Stewardship Update

As of December 1, we have received commitments toward our ministry planning for next year: 39 pledges totaling almost \$200,000. Our thanks to everyone who has responded not only with financial commitments but also of their time and talents.

If you have not had time to prayerfully consider how you will respond to God's blessings this year, please review the material you should have received from Holy Spirit and complete the estimate of giving pledge card and the time and talents form. Our ministry depends on the response of our members and friends with commitments of time, energy, abilities, and money. Every commitment is important for we are connected to one another as one body in Christ. Please return your commitment as soon as possible, so we can plan for the coming year.

Tax Time Cometh

While we are still many months away from April 2020, the end of the year is approaching rapidly. You may want to consider contributing some shares to Lutheran Church of the Holy Spirit. Stocks that you have held for a long time and that have very low basis cost may be especially attractive as charitable gifts. Stock gifts have double value because they often avoid capital gains tax and they result in an income tax deduction for charitable gifts. Also, making a stock gift earlier in the fall - rather than waiting until the very end of the year - may help you avoid any fluctuations in the stock market. During the past month, several members made stock transfers to the church to fulfill their pledges and to contribute to the building and designated gifts fund. Few people contribute to the church just for the tax advantages yet it is a consideration for when you might want to make a contribution. As you look toward the end of the year and the special needs of our church budget, you might consider the timeliness of certain contributions now. Please be sure that if you make a transfer to the church, you notify our office so we can be sure all is completed in an orderly manner and proper credit is received.

Highlights from November 2020

The monthly Church Council meeting was held via Zoom on November 9th. Treasurer's report included monthly Benevolence offerings and other income of \$23,375 for October (YTD total is \$343,775 (including PPP loan amount)). Operating expenses were \$37,459 in October (YTD total is \$367,353).

The Pastor's report: Daniel Wright Middle School is interested in renting Fellowship Hall twice per week; details are being finalized. Other building use remains on hold due to the pandemic and in-person school closures. The congregation membership roster has been updated upon communication with inactive members. Mid-week Advent services will begin December 2 and will be conducted via Zoom. Indoor services began; procedures are reviewed and adapted to meet evolving circumstances and regulations. The Thanksgiving Day service will be a recorded service. The Task Force continues planning and monitoring of conditions, government guidelines, and Synod input. Discussions are underway regarding Christmas Eve worship and holiday decorations. Hanging of the Greens is scheduled for November 29, modified as appropriate under the circumstances. Christian Education reported that Trunk or Treat was well-attended and an amazing evening. Outdoor family activities are being planned for Hanging of the Greens, and a sign-up is available for families to volunteer to hang decorations inside. Tuesday LYFE and Sunday school continue. Remote Advent family activities are being planned. CUFF reported that a virtual fellowship game events are being planned. Human Needs reported that PADs collected food donations in November and Thanksgiving food donations were delivered to Vernon Township food pantry. Personnel reported that preparations are underway for staff evaluations. Property reported on a successful work day with another being planned. Joel is monitoring property conditions and conducting upkeep tasks; he will contact Comcast about security measures. Many outdoor lights have been replaced, thanks to volunteers. Joel continues to reach out about building use. Stewardship reported that Packets were mailed, and a video was prepared and circulated. Stewardship Sunday was November 15. Worship and Music reported on live-streaming of indoor services that occurred and adaptations to services based upon conditions and circumstances. Old Business: The Task Force continues to meet and plan, monitoring conditions, guidelines, guidance, and congregation considerations. The Council continues to receive updates and unanimously approves of the work of the Task Force. The Nominating Committee meets and is completing preparation of a slate of candidates. New Business: Committee reports will be due in December. A motion passed a remote conduct of the Annual Meeting on January 17, 2021, if circumstances dictate.

Next council meeting currently is scheduled for December 14th at 7:00 PM. All council meetings are open to Holy Spirit members. Minutes and reports of the council are kept in a public notebook in the narthex.

Annual Congregational Meeting


January 17, 2021
